Fabric Art and Crafts from Laura Wallace



Laura Wallace sent this photo of her latest batik project, a cheerful, intricate view of Great Brook Farm in Carlisle. Needless to say, we're looking forward to rescheduling Laura's workshop as soon as we can.

Laura also provided images of the "household helpers" she is knitting. She reports, "These are pretty mindless to make and come out beautifully! They are about 8 inches square or circular and can be used as fancy doilies under bowls or plants (with plastic underneath for the latter).

They are even handy as wipes for counters and dishes." Materials are Lily Sugar 'n Cream 100% cotton 4-ply yarn (available at Joann Fabrics) and knitting needles, with size 7 being preferable.

Laura notes that the samples in the photo (right) have yet not been blocked to make them more square. Two are a diagonal pattern, where you start with four stitches and then increase and then decrease to make the square. One is a basket weave, and the last is a



circular pattern where at the end you need to stitch the circle closed with a crochet hook or a needle with a large eye. If you would like the patterns, let Laura know: laura.b.wallace@gmail.com
