
Members' Juried I (MJ1): Painting and Sculpture, opening January 13


"The Salem Witch Trials: Reckoning and Reclaiming," through March 20

Whether it is the pulsating rhythms of the Beat generation's America in *On the Road* or the description of hometown life in *Maggie Cassidy,* the words of Lowell's native son **Jack Kerouac** (1922-1969) tantalize and inspire. The Arts League of Lowell invites artists to submit work in all media, inspired by specific passages of Kerouac's writing. This show is part of a citywide celebration of Kerouac's 100th birthday.

All submitted work must be accompanied by the specific quote that inspired it. The quotes will be displayed along with the artwork. Artists may enter up to three works.
